## “Immigration – Point Lookout to Locust Point”

On Saturday, 10 July 2010, the Maryland Genealogical Society is pleased to offer our Basics + Workshop. The program will feature talks by Bob Barnes, Wayne Schaumburg and John P. Deeben.

Bob Barnes will speak on “Immigration to the Chesapeake Bay area in the Colonial Period”. There were several types of immigrants: those who came voluntarily and paid their own way; those who came voluntarily but bound themselves to work for others for a certain specified period of time; those who were exiled to Maryland for their part in political rebellions; those who chose to come to Maryland instead of being hanged for a crime; and those who were brought involuntarily. Bob will discuss paper and digital sources that may help researchers.

Wayne Schaumburg will speak on “19th Century Baltimore - A City of Immigrants”, our city's role as a major port of entry for immigrants during the 19th century. By far, the largest wave of immigrants arrived in Baltimore between 1865 and 1914 when the city received over 1,100,000 foreigners. Most were from countries of central and Eastern Europe such as Germany, Poland, Russia, Austria-Hungary, and Bohemia. Many of these newcomers stayed in town just long enough to board a B&O train bound for points west. Others, though, would settle in Baltimore, raise families, and go to work for the railroads, the port, or the booming canning and garment industries. It's from this period that many of Baltimore's famous ethnic neighborhoods originated including the Irish 10th Ward, Little Italy, Greektown, the Oldtown Jewish community, and others. Known as "Ellis Island South" by 1900, it is interesting to note that Baltimore was second only to New York City in immigration during 1884, 1891, 1892, 1900 and 1902.

John P. Deeben will speak on “By Way of the Chesapeake: Maryland Passenger Arrival Records at the National Archives, 1820–1957”. This lecture discusses passenger arrival manifests, abstracts, and indexes at the National Archives that document immigration into Maryland through the port of Baltimore, with particular emphasis on differences between the earlier records of the U.S. Customs Service (1820–1891) and later records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service (1892–1957).

The program will be held from 9:30am to 1:00pm (registration opens at 9:00 am) at The Stable at Carroll Park, 1500 Washington Blvd., Baltimore, MD 21230. The cost is \$25 for MGS members and \$30 for non-members. The pre-registration deadline is 3 July. Walk-in registrants are welcome at an additional \$5.00 cost. As an added treat (and for an additional \$5.00 per person), you may wish to participate in the 2:00pm tour of the Mount Clare Museum House.
